Preschool for All - by the numbers

- Working with its first set of child care entrepreneurs
- 48 programs in 36 preschools
- 675 slots
- 24 home-based, 9 school-based (2 culturally specific), 15 centers
- Next year target is 1,500, then 2,500 the following year
- Grow until reach universal access, which is 11,000

Accessing Facilities - Barriers and Challenges

Cost of housing down payments impact available capital for space build out

Lack of an overview, high level understanding of the agencies, steps and correct sequence of engagement for permitting, zoning and licensing ECE facilities


Lack of availability of properties in areas proximate to families or areas of demand

Landlords can sell or convert space and force relocation of ECE provider as market opportunities present themselves.


Demands of running ECE program leave little time to supplement skills High tenant improvement costs impacts landlord willingness to rent and stress an already slim bottom line

Inability to secure funding through banks/other lenders early in the planning process creates uncertainty when providing letters of intent/ lease proposals and sets up unresolvable contingency loops


