#### History of Jefferson Funders Forum and the Rogue Valley Food Systems Peter Salant

• Peter shared the history of the Jefferson Funders Forum and food systems throughout the years (see attached).

- The Rogue Valley Food Systems Network's timeline can be tied back to a Jefferson Funders Forum meeting with Thrive and Access in 2007.
- The evolution from council to a nonprofit organization started with the closure/merger with Thrive in 2018. The Rogue Valley Food Systems Network absorbed three assets from Thrive: their nonprofit status, the Flavor Guide, and their financial resources.
- The merger allowed the organization to seek and pool funding activities, work collaboratively, and share powerful applications from different perspectives.
- Their work focuses on developing markets, convene those who do the work, and incubate projects.
- Funders were guided through the food systems, its realities, and overlaps.
- Activity: What is the current funding landscape of food systems? Please see notes from activity where funders noted areas of organizational and project support in the following sectors:
  - Food Waste Management
  - o Food System Emergency Preparedness and Resilience
  - Food Security and Access
  - Nutrition and Health
  - Consumer Demand and Marketing
  - Agricultural Production
  - o Environmental and Natural Resource
- The participants in the Rogue Valley Food Systems Network includes a staff, board of directors, an executive committee, and council working within *Research and Assessment, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, Network Management, Projects, and Programs*.
- The Community Food Assessment was last completed in 2012-13. The committee has representation from RVFSN, DEQ, Jackson Care Connect, United Way of Jackson County, Josephine County Food Bank, A Greater Applegate, OSU Extension, AllCare, Southern Oregon University, Access, and 1000 Friends of Oregon.
- Study objectives include:
  - Identify the current assets and gaps in our food system by developing an updated, collaborative Rogue
     Valley Community Food Assessment and Action Plan of Jackson and Josephine Counties.
  - To serve as analysis of the community's food system, outline a list of actions that will improve local food access, and result in economic and infrastructural improvements across the rogue Valley.
- Phase II is now in motion with the launch of an open survey on March 31, 2024. The survey will stay open until the committee feels they have good data that represents the community.

- Alumbra's work in the Rogue Valley started with the establishment of Rusted Gate Farm in 2019 as a nonprofit. The foundation has local roots in southern Oregon and the farming community. The Rusted gate serves as an innovation and demonstration lab. They experiment with traditional and alternative methods and share outcomes. The Rusted Gate Farm intends to identify a mix of income producing activities that will increase average farm income, promote environmental health, and insure long term financial security for small farms. As a nonprofit, they are responsive to community needs, which has led them to engage in food systems, education, and preparing for climate impacts on land and water stewardship.
- This learning paired with strategic evolution, has led to an expanding funding focus in Oregon.
- Alumbra's North Star programs align in southern Oregon through:
  - Economically viable models, rooted in Sense of Place, catalyzes investments in and inspiring adoption of models that restore the environment, honor community, and advance economic prosperity.
  - Restorative and humane land-based food solutions for a rapidly changing environment are sourced and scaled.
  - The next generation is translating experiential learning into blue and green careers and active citizenship.

#### Discussion: Everyone

#### Questions and discussions followed:

- Locally sourced meat, availability to process locally, infrastructure and policy needs, and what is on the horizon regarding manufacturing of food at state level. It's a complicated system.
- At the peak of the hemp boom, 47,000 acres of farmland was being used for hemp. Only 3% are still in production.
- The average age of a farmer is 58. Programs like Rogue Farm Corps, Changing Hands hope to pass along knowledge and land to upcoming farmers.
- Who/how is mapping occurring and how do individuals become part of the system change that allow people ownership?
- How does the school system partner and how difficult is it to get into the schools? Schools need programs in their curriculum versus one teacher taking on the garden and once they leave the garden program is gone.
- How can we provide vocational education and job training in the field?
- School gardens need to be part of a school culture, funded through the school district with administration extra duty pay.
- What is the best leverage to connect in collaboration, not duplicate or compete for funding with organizations like Rogue Valley Farm 2 School, Family Nurturing Center, and others providing education, school/community gardens, and food education.
